

Who Governs the Algorithms? Policy Actors Explained

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“Someone should regulate AI” assumes a someone. In practice AI governance is a crowded stage where six kinds of actors share power, move at different speeds, and check one another. Knowing who does what turns headlines about “AI rules” into something you can actually parse.

THE SIX ACTORS

» Legislatures

Write the binding statutes (the EU AI Act being the landmark) — powerful but slow, often arriving after the technology shifts.

» Regulators & agencies

Apply existing law to AI now: consumer-protection, competition, privacy, and election authorities act years before new statutes do.

» Courts

Settle live disputes — copyright and training data, liability for AI harms, likeness rights — creating precedent that binds harder than guidance.

» Standards bodies

NIST, ISO, IEEE and peers define the measurable frameworks (risk management, provenance formats like C2PA) that laws then reference.

» The labs themselves

Usage policies, safety frameworks, and deployment choices function as private regulation for millions of users — governance without a ballot.

» Civil society & researchers

Journalists, academics, and advocacy groups surface harms and audit claims; much enforcement begins as their reporting.

HOW THE PIECES INTERACT

The usual sequence: researchers document a harm, journalists amplify it, agencies act under existing powers, courts test boundaries, standards bodies codify measurements, and legislatures finally write it down. Meanwhile labs adjust policies to preempt harsher rules. Influence flows in all directions — and industry lobbying shapes every stage.

READING GOVERNANCE NEWS

Ask: which actor is speaking, and what force does their instrument carry? A voluntary commitment, an agency enforcement action, and a statute are different weights of “rule.” Most “AI is now regulated” headlines describe the lightest one.
